STUART BAILEY

Stuart Bailey, born in 1970, resides in Sydney. His practice centres on site-specific installation that incorporates a diversity of media. Bailey recontextualises found objects juxtapositioning them with painting, drawing, text and photography with a gritty aesthetic. He is also inspired by eighties rock iconography. Solo exhibitions include Low level week (with Rozalind Drummond), RMIT Project Space, Melbourne, 2007; Party H.Q., Enjoy Gallery, Wellington, 2007; and Crafting self-esteem (with Basil Hadley), Fremantle Arts Centre, Fremantle, 2007. Group exhibitions include Dislocated, Toronto Foreshore, Canada, 2006; Process cave, Kings ARI, Melbourne, 2005; and Mixed business, Seventh Gallery, Melbourne, 2004. In 2005 he undertook the Australia Council's Los Angeles residency. GUY BENFIELD

Born in 1964, Sydney, Guy Benfield is based in Brooklyn, New York. His work concerns the histories of painting, sculpture, performance and video in Modernism. He seeks to explore the tenuous membrane separating the personal and intimate from the public domain challenging the boundaries between 'studio, quasi-theatre, workshop and medieval kinetic kindergarten'. His solo exhibitions include Mother Door Spirit Level, Jack the Pelican Presents, Brooklyn, New York, 2007; X VOLTA, Kaliman Gallery, Sydney, 2007; and Situation Rendered Obsolete, Vera Cortes Art Agency, Lisbon, Portugal, 2005. Group shows include Full Nelson, BRIXX Gallerie - Büro for Post-Modern Communication, Berlin, 2007; Aftermath: Performance as Installation/Installation as Performance, Artspace, Sydney, 2007; and Satellite, Project of the Shanghai Biennale, 2006. In 2005 Benfield completed a residency at the Maumaus School of Visual Arts, Lisbon, and in 2004 he was a recipient of the Anne & Gordon Samstag International Visual Arts Scholarship.

ADAM CULLEN

Adam Cullen, born 1965, resides in the Blue Mountains, New South Wales. With a dark and humorous sensibility his practice delves into the excremental aspects of today's society. Cullen explores wide-ranging themes associated with grunge, punk, television and the hypocrisy of consumer culture. Cullen's solo exhibitions include the survey show Let's get lost, Art Gallery of New South Wales, Sydney, 2008; I AM THE CHEESE, Kaliman Gallery, Sydney, 2007; and Stupid Heaven, Greenaway Art Gallery, Adelaide, 2007. Recent group exhibitions include Who let the dogs out, Lake Macquarie City Art Gallery, New South Wales, 2007; The Grey Voice, Tin Sheds Gallery, University of Sydney, 2005; and Interesting Times, Museum of Contemporary Art, Sydney, 2005. He is the recipient of many prizes including the 2000 Archibald Prize, is included in many private and public collections, and was selected for the 25th Bienal de Sao Paulo. Cullen is represented by Kaliman Gallery, Sydney; Tolarno Galleries, Melbourne; Greenaway Art Gallery, Adelaide; and Heiser Gallery, Brisbane.

REBECCA DAGNALL

Rebecca Dagnall, born Melbourne, 1972, resides in Fremantle. Dagnall engages in a close observation of her own suburban space investigating the ordinariness of life and the subtle nostalgic beauty to be found within it. Dagnall's exhibition history includes Staff Room,

Moores Building, Fremantle, 2007; Figured Out, Church Gallery, Claremont, 2004; Art and Words, Berliner Kunstproject, Berlin, 2003; and Living Room, Bread Box Gallery, Perth, 2003. Dagnall is a Lecturer in Photography in the Department of Art, Faculty of Built Environment, Art and Design, Curtin University.

CECILIA FOGELBERG

Swedish-born Cecilia Fogelberg, born 1976, is a Melbourne-based artist whose practice incorporates soft sculptures, painting and drawing. With more than a touch of twisted humour, Fogelberg subverts the innocence attached to mythological, fairy-tale and legendary characters. Through this process she explores her own cultural heritage and identity. Born 1968, Sydney-based artist and writer Alex Gawronski engages in a practice concerned with interrogating – often with humour – the power relationships extant in local and globalised art worlds. Ian Haig, born in 1964, resides in Melbourne. Haig works across media to explore the strangeness and obscurity of everyday reality negotiated through subject matter that is at times perverse and provocative. Through the lens of low cultural forms his practice focuses on the themes of the human body, devolution, mutation, transformation and psychopathology. Matthew Hunt, born 1967, resides in Perth. Moving across media Hunt considers how relationships are increasingly nuanced in a global context. With personal and elusive gestures Hunt distills text to reanimate buried memories and moments. Recent solo exhibitions include Falling to Earth, Dianne Tanzer Gallery, Melbourne, 2008, and End of the Earth, Conical Inc, Melbourne, 2007. Born 1975, Sydney-based Lucas Ihlein's practice is concentrated on the relationship between artist and audience and the artist's potential to create participatory, social situations via collaborative process. He seeks to question the role of the art object as an emotive and sentimental surrogate for meaning. They are retro-styled and staged to provide a commentary on topics such as the pervasiveness of information technologies and consumption.
